## NOTES

1. たかはしさん

さん is a title of respect added to a person's name, so it cannot be used after one's own name.  $\eth h$  may be used with both male and female names, and with either surnames or given names.

2 こちらは スミスさんです。

こちら ("this one") implies "this person here" and is a polite way of saying "this person." It is used when introducing one person to another.

3. (わたしは) スミスです。

Especially in conversational Japanese, わたし ("I") is hardly ever used. あ なた ("you") is similarly avoided, especially when addressing superiors, in which case the person's surname followed by さん is used.

4. のぞみデパートの たかはしです。

The particle  $\mathcal{O}$  attaches to nouns, and the noun- $\mathcal{O}$  combination modifies the word that comes after it. O expresses belonging or affiliation. Here it shows that Mr. Takahashi belongs to, in the sense that he works for, Nozomi Department Store. Japanese customarily give their company name and position when being introduced.

5. よろしく おねがいします。

A phrase used when being introduced, よろしく おねがいします is usually combined with はじめ まして. It is also used when taking one's leave after having asked a favor. よろしく means "well" and is a request for the other person's favorable consideration in the future.
